I have been using an app called "SNIP" that makes capturing images from the internet, or any file, very simple to use.

Without "Snip", you would have to right click an image and copy/paste into your document. Sometimes, depending on the picture filename, this method doesn't work and no images show up on your document. In that case, you would need to right click the image, save as, then insert a picture into your document adding two more steps.

These are both common practices to get images onto your document. However, if you only need a portion of that image or a portion of an article, these steps are useless since you have very little options to edit these images in your word processor. In order to edit, you would have to go through a photo editing program like Photoshop or iPhoto adding another step.

With "Snip", you can capture entire images, portions of an image, or portions of an article in the first step sending them to a folder of your choice. The second step and final step will be to insert the photo into your document from the destination folder you chose.

"Snip" takes away time consuming steps and helps you become more efficient with making handouts for the class.

I implement "Snip" into my lessons by creating my handouts more efficiently. Since I use a music notation program very often, it is even more difficult to drop those images into a word processor. With "Snip" I can do this without any problems or time consuming steps. I can also use the snipped images in Google Docs. Since Google Docs is already a time saver, putting "Snip" to use makes it even more valuable.
